

FOR ALL SMALL LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS - RULES

1. Animals found in ill health will be refused. Animals becoming ill during the show will be isolated and disqualified.
2. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their animals and must provide containers for such. Exhibitors must have their animals fed and watered by 9am Saturday and Sunday mornings. Exhibitor must provide for the care of their own animals – not a parent or friend. For each animal entered, exhibitor must provide a food crock and a water bottle or crock. Paper or plastic cups are not allowed for the health of the animals. Failure to provide adequate food and water will result in disqualification.
3. Exhibitor is responsible for setting up their own animal's pen at the fair. In the case of multi-pen cages, exhibitor must assist others with the cage set up. If exhibitor is unable to help with set up due to school, he/she may appoint another person to take their place (replacement person's name must be noted on entry form). Failure to assist in set up will result in disqualification.
4. Exhibitor is responsible for cleaning up their own animal's pen at the fair including the cage and the cage area. In the case of multi-pen cages, exhibitor must assist others with the clean-up. Failure to assist with clean up will result in forfeiture of awards – no exceptions.
5. Exhibitor is responsible for keeping their animal's cage and cage area clean. The cage must be clean and ready for public viewing by 9am on Saturday and Sunday. Failure to care for the animal will result in disqualification.
6. In order to be judged, animals must be checked by show clerks before being placed in cages. Exhibitor will be issued a plastic fair tag for each animal (poultry, rabbit, cavy and cat departments) pre-filled with the entry information. After clean-up on Sunday, exhibitor must return the plastic tag to the show clerk, at which time their awards will be released.
7. Animals must remain in cages except during showmanship and judging.
8. Entries must be cleaned up and picked up promptly at the close of show on Sunday.
9. Entries may have to be limited and preference will be given to the sponsoring county.
10. No animals allowed on the grounds unless entered in the Fair.
11. No animals in Exhibit Building per Chino Fairgrounds contract (Cats exempt).

ENTRY GUIDELINES

1. Entry forms must have name, address, phone, age and club for each member and be signed where specified. If a replacement person will be doing the member's set up on Friday, that person's name must also be on the entry form.
2. All small livestock may be further subdivided by breed, variety and color if more than 5 animals are entered of any 1 type. This will be left to the discretion of the Small Livestock Director.
3. Fair Management reserves the right to reject or disqualify any Small Livestock Department entry when due cause has been shown.

POULTRY DEPARTMENT - RULES

1. All birds must be identified by a leg band with numbers conforming to the entry forms. Any duplication of leg band numbers in the same class must be eliminated and changes recorded on the Judges' Show Report. Birds that need leg bands upon check in will be given one by the Small Livestock Division at a fee of \$1 per bird.
2. Birds must be shown and judged in the proper division and class for breed, variety, age and sex.

All birds in the Standard Breed divisions will be judged using the American System. The standard of perfection of the American Poultry Association will be used.

All birds in the live meat bird division will be judged by the Danish System. The standard of perfection of the American Poultry Association will be used.

All birds in the game birds divisions will be judged by the Danish System. The standard of perfection of the American Poultry Association will be used.

All birds in the pigeon divisions will be judged by the Danish System. The standard of perfection of the American Poultry Association will be used.

RABBIT DEPARTMENT

RULES

1. Show is not ARBA sanctioned.
2. Must be clearly earmarked by tattoo or permanent marker, in left ear. Number must correspond with number/letter on entry form. Rabbits with illegible mark or not marked will be marked by the show clerk at check-in at a fee of \$1 per animal.
3. All entry forms must show breed, variety (color), age (junior, intermediate, senior), gender and tattoo for each animal.
4. All classes judged under ARBA standards of perfection.
5. Rabbits are entered at owner's risk.
6. No does with litters.
7. No entry limits.

DIVISION 330 – PET RABBITS

1. For rabbits who cannot be shown at an ARBA event or entered in another division in the Rabbit Department. This includes cross breed, cross variety, altered, and disabled rabbits.

Pet Rabbit Judging Criteria and Guidelines

Pet rabbits are defined as any non-pedigreed rabbit that is four months of age or older. Pedigreed rabbits must be entered in the standard rabbit division. Rabbits under four months of age must be shown under the “Pets and Small Animals” division so they are housed indoors during the fair. Pet rabbits are expected to remain at the fair until it closes on Sunday and are housed with the other rabbits in the small livestock area. Member is responsible for providing food, water, and bowls for their rabbit.

A written introduction to the animal must accompany the rabbit. Suggestions for things to include – how member acquired the rabbit, family tree (real or theoretical), ways it is

unique from other rabbits, and so forth. No more than one page will be read by the judge, though member may include more for others to view.

Pet rabbits can have either permanent ear tag numbers or temporary tags (masking tape or marker) on their left ear. If using temporary tags, simply number them as follows –

Example: Member John Smith's cavies would be JS1, JS2 and so on.

CAVY DEPARTMENT - RULES

1. All animals must be earmarked with either a permanent tag or marker in their left ear prior to arrival to the show. Ear tag letter/number must be indicated on the entry form. Any duplicates will be corrected by the show clerk at check in. Any animal arriving without an ear tag, permanent or marker, will be ear tagged by the show clerk at check in at a fee of \$1 per animal.
2. Cavies used in showmanship must also be entered in one of the divisions below.

JUDGING STANDARDS USED IN DIVISION 357

Pet Cavy Judging Criteria and Guidelines

Pet cavies are defined as any non-pedigreed cavy that is four months of age or older. Pedigreed cavies must be entered in the standard cavy division. Cavies under four months of age must be shown under the “Pets and Small Animals” division so they are housed indoors during the fair. Pet cavies are expected to remain at the fair until it closes on Sunday and are housed with the other cavies in the small livestock area. Member is responsible for providing food, water, and bowls for their cavy.

A written introduction to the animal must accompany the cavy. Suggestions for things to include – how member acquired the cavy, family tree (real or theoretical), ways it is unique from other cavies, and so forth. No more than one page will be read by the judge, though member may include more for others to view.

Pet cavies can have either permanent ear tag numbers or temporary tags (masking tape or marker) on their left ear. If using temporary tags, simply number them as follows –

SMALL LIVESTOCK CLEAN CAGE COMPETITION

RULES

Score will be lowered in section 3.b. if the judges observe persons other than the small livestock exhibitor cleaning or doing any other type of work. This includes brothers, sisters, and friends.

Exhibitor will be judged on all their animals in a particular department (rabbits, poultry, and cavies).

Exhibitors in the pet rabbits and pet cavy divisions are also eligible for the Clean Cage awards.

CAT DEPARTMENT - RULES

1. Cats are judged on overall condition, health, and care. Breed standards are NOT applied.
2. Cats owned and maintained by members of the Pets and Small Animals project. Indicate Cat Care on the club enrollment form in the fair packet.
3. Must show vet certificate of proper immunizations upon check in.
4. Show will provide a cage. Member must provide everything else for their cat, including curtains or a blanket for the outside of the cage.
5. No nursing mothers, litters or kittens under 4 months of age.
6. Exhibitor responsible for all maintenance of cat during show.
7. Cat will be removed from show if any signs of illness are observed.
8. One day show on Saturday. Cats go home Saturday afternoon.

DIVISION 480 – CAT

Class 2 – Adult (Altered and Unaltered) – 8 months and older

DIVISION 481 – EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

3. Entries must be made on entry form. No entry fee.
